4 Pupils share their experiences of being in the CCF

Pupil 1

I joined the QMGS CCF in September 2017, and on my first CCF session I was given the opportunity to go on an Outwards Bounds weekend away to Farchynys. During this weekend, we hiked around Snowdonia working as a group of cadets to guide ourselves around the mountains. This was a great experience for me, as a new member of the CCF, to get to know fellow cadets. The memorable experiences continued at school: learning how to safely fire a rifle, marching in the Remembrance Parades and learning how to disguise ourselves in forests on field days.
