

As a result of their win, the group will enjoy a week-long cultural immersion programme in Beijing over



the Easter Break. The school also had success in the individual competition with Thomas Sharma finishing as runner -up in the National Final.

# HOUSE OF LORDS

Alek Reimus travelled down to Westminster, surrounded by the Brexit maelstrom, to conduct a formal interview in the House of Lords with Lord Jitesh Gadhia in his capacity as a Youth Integration Champion.

He gained an insight into how governments over the last 50 years have dealt with the issue of racial integration and to what extent it remains an issue. His questions discussed the issues of social integration in Britain and drew on conclusions from Dame Louise Casey's review and the government's Race Review Audit.

Lord Gadhia has worked very closely with other Parliamentarians, the government, charities and commercial institutions in order to find ways to ascertain common ground between various social groups and promote greater social integration.

His most successful and recent work in this area has been to introduce Khadi poppies (of the type that Gandhi wove) to commemorate the contribution of British Indian soldiers in both world wars.

Lord Gadhia was himself optimistic about the prospects of race relations in Britain but added that more work was needed.



#### BAR MOCK TRIAL

On Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> November, 16 students took part in the National Bar Mock Trial Regional Heat in Birmingham. This competition aims to give young people an insight into the workings of the legal system. Throughout the first round, the team conducted 3 trials, prosecuting and defending cases concerning acid attacks and money laundering.

After winning all three trials with strong performances from all involved, the team were shortlisted to take part in the final round that would decide who would qualify for the National Final. The final trial was judged by David Swinnerton, Deputy Head of Chambers at Cornwall Street and an old boy of QM. After a closely contested final, the team narrowly lost to a strong KES Stratford Team. This is the first year that a QM Team has reached the final round of a Regional Heat. #### SYNTHESIS CLUB AND CHEMISTRY COMPETITIONS

Chemical synthesis and chess have much in common: the rules are straightforward but it is in their execution that the real skill lies. The aim of synthesis club is to teach the rules and practice application. It is an opportunity to experience first-hand the practical techniques involved, the terminology used by chemists, and how to make an array of compounds. The first series of compounds investigated were azo dyes. This project is now being incorporated into Krish Shah's Arkwright Scholarship, using the dyes to colour polyester casts. Inorganic liquids are also being looked into



as part of a collaboration with the Institute for Research in Schools. These unique liquids offer an alternative to environmentally unfriendly volatile organic compounds.

QM pupils have had great success in various external competitions recently. Following a tremendous performance in the qualification round, the school's team took part in the Royal Society of Chemistry's Top-of-the-Bench regional final. Held at the new Collaborative Teaching Laboratory at the University of Birmingham, pupils sat a written test and completed a practical assignment.



#### RUGBY

From cup semi-finals and plate finals to broken bones and narrow defeats, the season was one of great highs and unfortunate lows. The season started optimistically, having lost a bulk of the side through the previous year, new recruits and old faces banded together to make a competitive 1st XV. Under captain Joel Pepper. QM, travelling away for the majority of matches this season, found themselves battling in every game they participated in, gradually growing stronger, building chemistry within the squad, and starting to play for each other. As the season progressed, critical injuries crippled the squad, however, with the heart of the Year 11 side stepping up, the team recuperated and continued on. The team also faced tough times in terms of coaching. With the

unfortunate absence of Mr Taylor, the team were lucky to have both Mr Collins and Mr Bletcher step forward to take on the role of 1st XV coaches. The team thank both of them for their ongoing efforts, aiding player development within the side. #### BASKETBALL
