A particularly significant week featured a presentation on Polari, the British secret language used by the gay community to safely communicate with one another in the early 20th century.

Hate and judgement has no place at QMGS and newcomers are encouraged to speak up for what they believe in.

The society meets every Friday lunchtime at 13.20 in Q9 and welcomes all.
