A think piece for the week

A personal story by Mr Reynolds

At the start of May, I lost my father over in Ireland. His long fight against Parkinson's finally caught up with him. This latest battle was one he could not win. The one that everyone of us will all have to face at some point. One of the consequences of the times we currently live in is that we cannot have a proper funeral. Covid-19 social distancing meant we couldn't bury nor celebrate his life the way we wanted to and how our forebears have done for generations. The Irish wake, where the living, the bereaved and the dead remain bound together, could not happen. Like the ancient Trojans looking after Hector's corpse, the Irish wake looks after the loved one with someone always staying with the remains, guarding against Hades throughout the night. We couldn't do this. An ancient and well-trodden way to grieve has stopped. The processing of grief has been altered. This is an additional cruelty of Covid-19.

I found myself having to social distance knowing that if I gave my mother a hug this could be our worst nightmare. I so wanted to give her the biggest hug, but couldn't. We kept our 2 metres apart, no mass, no gathering, with only 10 people by the graveside. I travelled from England to Ireland in a quiet overnight ferry trying to avoid all contact with people and surfaces to help minimise the risk of infection, explaining to customs at either end the purpose of my essential travel. The ferry was empty with only myself in a room that could seat 200 people. Alone I was, my wife and children unable to attend. The car doubled up as my bed at night, I could not stay in the family home. I brought my own food and lots of anti-bacteria wipes. The logistics of going from A to B across borders, trying to minimise risk, was a heavy additional burden. My sisters couldn't say goodbye to dad, one being in America and the other also abroad rightfully fearful of bringing an infection back to her own family. Another heart breaking angle to Staying at home, Saving lives.

Dad left this life peacefully, at home and in no pain. When the critical care team at home called us to say his time was near my sisters and I couldn't visit him. Normally, we would be on the first plane home. We couldn't hold his hand as he slipped away nor say our last words to him. All we could do was Zoom, in those final moments. At the funeral, we scattered and kept our distance. I couldn't carry his coffin. My sisters zoomed at the funeral. How times have changed, but it meant they got to see those precious moments that they wouldn't have seen otherwise. When he was buried, I went back to our family home and sat outside, alone raising *A Parting Glass* to his life. Mum inside, alone, too. The loneliest drink I've ever had. This was when we should have had dozens of people sitting around, remembering my dad, telling stories.... grieving. How Covid-19 has changed our world in many ways.

So what is this thought of mine? Apart from being unable to properly grieve due to the cruelty of Covid-19, my message is one of adapting to a changing world. This crisis will pass at some point, but our world will be different. By how much is anybody's guess, but it will be different. Having to do the unconventional, to change our habits, to re-think how we work, play or mourn is what is needed to keep our world ticking by.

New DfE guidance and home learning

I'm sure that you will have followed the announcements earlier in the week about the next stages of the nationa approach to lockdown. The DfE's guidance for parents can be found here:

There appears to be an appetite for students to begin to return to school from June 1st, but this is aimed more at primary schools in the first instance. The guidance states that:

"Secondary schools, sixth form, and further education colleges to begin [from 1st June] some face to face support with year 10 and 12 pupils, although we do not expect these pupils to return on a full-time basis at this stage"

We don't know what this will look at this stage and there is a significant amount of risk assessment and planning we need to do before we even think about bringing students back in. My number one priority is the safety and welfare of staff and students. I will communicate when we know more.

This means that the emphasis on home learning will continue for some time and we continue to keep up our support via Teams and other online sources. It is important that students engage with this content and liaise with staff if there are issues.




