## SPEECH DAY

## WORLD HIJAB DAY

As a culturally rich and diverse school community, the celebration of days such as World Hijab Day is just one of the many ways we promote inclusivity, understanding and greater appreciation of differences. World Hijab Day was created in 2013 by Nazma Khan, encouraging religious tolerance. On 4th February, a group of sixth form girls organised an ethereally decorated lunchtime workshop in support of the day which had happened earlier in the week. Amongst the many activities were; the opportunity to try on a hijab, fact files about influential hijabi women in popular culture and hijabi themed scrabble and guess-who games. There were also insightful PowerPoint presentations given by Mariyah Ali (Y13) focused on the context around the day and myth busting. A whole school assembly

was also presented by Mariyah Ali (Y13), Amal Usman (Y12) and Zaynab Malik (Y12) with a particular emphasis on their personal journey with wearing the hijab. Wearing the hijab is important to many Muslim women; not only is it an outward expression of faith and a connection to Allah, it also allows them to retain their modesty. It was extremely encouraging to see so many pupils getting involved in the activities and participating in questionnaires. The events highlighted that World Hijab Day is not only important if you yourself are a hijabi woman, but also for everyone regardless of gender or religion. 

### THE ORWELL YOUTH PRIZE 2022

The Orwell Foundation, an independent charity, celebrates the life, work, and legacy of the writer George Orwell (1903-50). Two of Orwell's novels, *Animal Farm* (1945) and *Nineteen Eighty-Four* (1949), have had a profound influence on the post-war world while his non-fiction writing includes *The Road to Wigan Pier* (1937), *Homage to Catalonia* (1938), and a number of celebrated essays on a wide range of subjects.

In the Orwell Foundation's own words, "We use Orwell's remarkable legacy to celebrate honest writing and reporting, uncover hidden lives, confront uncomfortable truths, and, through the Orwell Youth Prize, to encourage all young people to think and write creatively and critically."

This year, students at QMGs are taking part in the Orwell Youth Prize for the first time and are preparing pieces of journalism, essays, short stories, blog posts, poems, and play scripts. This year the competition also includes video game designs. The theme for 2022 is 'Coming Up for Air: Writing the Climate Crisis'. Entrants are invited to write about how the climate crisis affects the people, places, and things around them.

The deadline for those who wish to submit their work and receive feedback is 22nd April and the final submission deadline is 3rd June.

### AN INTERVIEW WITH U18 RUGBY

Will Roberts, Captain of the Senior Rugby Team, sat down with Nkembeng Nkengfoa, prior to the Staffordshire County Cup final.

***Coming out of COVID restrictions, how has the return to rugby been affected?***

I definitely think that the squad's handling and fitness had suffered as a result of Covid restrictions, which was probably to be expected. This was reflected in a rough start to the season for the First XV. However, the improvement over the season has been outstanding for every player in the squad - which is reflected in the progress in the Staffs County Cup.

***What has been the most memorable match of the season so far?***
