MISBORN (series) by Brandon Sanderson

Mistborn is a trilogy which rivals even the best magic and adventure books. Published in 2006-2008 and written by Brandon Sanderson, this series is a creative take on the fantasy genre, following the story of a street urchin named Vin, in a world unlike ours.

Vin is different from other skaa, the term in the Final Empire for the poor and enslaved. She is a Mistborn, a title for a person who has the power to 'burn' and control metal, to manipulate minds, and enhance physical attributes. This power catches the infamous Kelsier's eye, who is another Mistborn, experienced and powerful. He and his crew of Misting thieves, people who can burn only 1 of the 10 metals, have one goal in mind: overthrow the Lord Ruler the 'God' of the Final Empire, holding almost limitless power- or so it seems.

Though this series could prove a challenging read, I believe that it is worth the time, and I highly recommend it.

GRIMEBOY

Few productions greet their audiences with the low lighting and boisterous beats of a rave. In this *GrimeBoy*, a new play by Birmingham Poet Laureate Casey Bailey, was unique.

The play, which a group of Year 8s and Year 12s caught in a performance matinee at Birmingham Rep, tells the story of GrimeBoy who longs to be the grime greatest artist generation. lts story of the relationship between art and violence, friendship and the loss of young life are told through a mixture of rap and prose dialogue that together make for a memorable and exciting dramatic experience.

The *mise en scène* was a highlight, producing a fluid dramatic space dominated by looming stereo speakers that are transformed by turns and the actions of the four-man cast (three principals and a DJ in a role like a Greek chorus) into the seats of a bus, the tower-blocks of the inner city and the cosy comfort of a bedroom.
