I hope that you enjoy your evening with us and look forward to welcoming you into our community in the future



QM Houses

Aragon House represents the international ethos of the School. It takes its name from Catherine of Aragon, the mother of Queen Mary.

The arrows of Aragon currently displayed on the school badge are its symbol, and its red colour is taken from the colours of the flag of Aragon.

Gryphon House represents the spirit of community which distinguishes Queen Mary's. It is named after the heraldic device which forms the crest of our Founders, George and Nicholas Hawe.

The symbol is shared, appropriately, with the QM Club. The gryphon on the Hawes' coat of arms in the Hall is gold and the house colour is its modern equivalent: yellow.

Darby House represents the spirit of enterprise that characterises the school. It is named after Mr SL Darby, who was Headmaster of the School between 1956 and 1979. His enterprising leadership brought about the new buildings at Mayfield and the purchase of Farchynys.

Mr Darby was also responsible for the preservation of QM as a grammar school. The symbol of the house is the distinctive skyline of the buildings and the house colour is blue – the colour of the school blazer.

Petypher House represents the academic tradition of Queen Mary's as a Grammar School.

It is named after the first known Headmaster and takes as its symbol a book (a copy of Virgil's Aeneid) which is known as Petypher's Virgil and is one of the school's oldest possessions.

We have selected green as the colour as this was used as the livery of the Tudor monarchs in the 16th century.

Our Four Pillars of the School

Academic in Purpose Enterprising in Spirit International in Outlook Generous in Approach



The Four Pillars of the School are what we believe are the core values of our community.

We believe that every student should strive to uphold and fulfil each pillar – whether that is through academic excellence, participation on foreign trips, charity work or innovation.

Four Pillars: Academic in Purpose

Throughout the school, our aim is to stretch and challenge **every** student through a broad and balanced curriculum.

In Year 7, boys will study English, Mathematics, Science, a Modern European Foreign Language, Geography, History, ICT, Design Technology, Religious Studies, Art, PSHEE, Music and a generous allocation of time to PE, Games and Swimming. All students in Year 7 also learn Mandarin Chinese.

In Year 8, the curriculum diversifies with Biology, Chemistry and Physics replacing Science.

At GCSE, all students study English Language, English Literature, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Religious Studies as part of their core curriculum. Students then choose three option subjects alongside this core.

The school offers a traditional academic curriculum to its sixth form student body. All students choose three academic subjects. Alongside these A Level options, students are also be expected to follow another academic option. This may be Further Maths, the EPQ or a range of other courses including Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs).

We will also expect students to take on an element of mentoring or volunteering during their time in the sixth form.

The final expectation is that students become involved with an extra-curricular activity in order to develop key employability skills, such as leadership, teamwork and organisation.



Four Pillars: International in Outlook

Global understanding and perspective is fast becoming a necessity in the modern world. Here at QM, we provide students with a huge plethora of opportunity to visit different countries.

From the space camps of Florida to a trekking expedition in Borneo; from the Battlefields of Belgium and France to an exchange in China; from skiing in Canada to tapas in Barcelona, students have plenty of chances to gain understanding of different cultures and communities, and enrich their understanding of the world beyond the restraints of the classrooms of Walsall.

To do so is very much in the spirit of our motto quas dederis solas semper habebis opes: It is what you give that you will keep as eternal riches.













Combined Cadet Force (CCF)



Farchynys

Farchynys, the school's Welsh Centre, is located on the stunning Mawddach Estuary in southern Snowdonia with views over to Cadair Idris. Purchased for the school in 1963, it has been a centre for adventure and learning in a contrasting setting for the past 50 years.

All year 7 students visit Farchynys in the summer of their first year in a series of trips with other members of their form group. These "Learning to Learn" weeks form an end to the year when students learn about learning in other contexts and about working with each other. Typical activities include visits to Harlech Castle, a local slate mine, a trip to the nearby Blue Lake and creating their own meal one evening.

In December 2016, the Headmaster was pleased to announce the purchase of two further properties on the Farchynys estate – the Barn (pictured right) and the Cottage. These purchases, mainly enabled through very generous donations, have ensured that the expanding school is safeguarded in the use of the facility for future generations of Marians.
