When asked about how they felt about their new roles, Mazen stated that he 'felt a mixture of emotions' due to the fact that the role of captain is a 'huge responsibility'. However, he was proud to represent the school and is honoured to take this opportunity to 'positively influence younger students'. Estelle added that she is 'excited to work with the rest of the PSLT' who all have their different strengths enabling the team to be 'a team of change'. Being the female captain of school, it is important to Estelle that she comes across as an affirmative leader. Estelle, as well as being the second female in the history of the school to gain the role of captain, is also the first black female captain of school. This is a great achievement for her and hopefully a step towards more inclusivity and diversity amongst the leaders of today.

When asked about what they hoped to achieve in the upcoming academic year ,Mazen stated that he wants to try and 'amplify student voices' as well as engage students in activities 'beyond the school curriculum'. Furthermore, he would love to 'organise volunteering opportunities and fundraising events chosen by the students themselves'. Estelle ended by giving advice to any students who hope to one day achieve captaincy; she declared "you are a leader...which requires a lot of work", "get involved in any opportunity you can in order to develop your leadership skills", "stand up for what you believe in", "have a good set of friends that will support you through the process of becoming captain". Lastly, she added, 'talk to the captains of school and gain advice from us, we are always around school and are happy to answer any questions'.

Well, it seems as if we have two very ambitious and determined captains. I know that you will join me in congratulating them and we wish them the best of luck for this upcoming academic year. Well done Mazen and Estelle!

Grimeboy SYS Theatre Trip

The See Yourself Group had the privilege of attending the Birmingham Rep theatre to see the new play 'GrimeBoy'. The See Yourself Group aims to incorporate more diverse stories into the English curriculum, enabling students to see themselves represented in the books that they read. 'GrimeBoy' is a recent play written by the upcoming playwright, poet, author and performer Casey Bailey. 'GrimeBoy' was commissioned by the Birmingham Rep to run in April 2022, and his other play, 'Please Do Not Touch' was selected as part of the Vault Festival in 2022. Bailey was born and grew up in Birmingham and the influence of this is evident in his work, such as his love letter to Birmingham, 'Dear Brum', and his 'my Birmingham story' distributed by the National Literacy Trust. This featured his poem entitled 'Step Step', which is a great piece of poetry in its own right.

'GrimeBoy' itself is a story about perseverance and strength as we meet the young protagonist Grime Boy who hopes to make it in the music industry of rap. The play touches on themes such as racial identity, loss and violence. Its beautiful portrayal of a young black man's struggle is aided by the fast-paced music and the use of lighting. On the 8th of July, Year 12 historians had the opportunity to visit the oldest museum in the UK, the University of Oxford's Ashmolean Museum. Founded in 1682, it



houses millions of objects dating from antiquity to the medieval era and the Renaissance, all the way to the mid 20th century. Roman statues, Egyptian sarcophagi, a Boeotian war helmet, Mughal art, Japanese prints and early Italian paintings. These were just some of the things that our students were able to explore across the four floors of the stunning museum.

Leading the QM students to Cornmarket Street for lunch, Mr Reynolds took on the role of the students' very own tour guide around the city. He continued with his enriching comments during the students' walk to the Pitt Rivers Museum and the Museum of Natural History, giving brief historical accounts of major monuments, buildings and streets.

In the Museum of Natural History, the students were able to admire imposing dinosaur bones, colossal taxidermied land and sea animals, and different stones, minerals and rocks. The Pitt Rivers, focusing on anthropology, transported the students to the practices of our ancestors, displaying a formidable collection of ancient games, dolls, theatre masks, playing rackets, weapons like guns and spears, and everyday objects of society expanding from all continents and times. **MEHTAB KAUR**

CHANGE YOUR MIND As we celebrate the success of the 6th year of Change Your Mind, the future looks even brighter.

From September 2022, Mrs McPhee has ambitious plans to expand the scheme from 36 to 48 pupils in Year 12, while adding 2 new workshops (one exploring neurodiversity, and another on further first aid). All members of CYM will have a pupil in the lower school to mentor (from difficulties with emotions to behavioural support or even organization skills). Following these changes, expansion across both the Mercian Trust and across the country is planned to continue. By end of the following school year, CYM will have 116 schools involved across 75 local education authorities across the UK. Consistently, pupils have demonstrated their generosity by giving up their time at very short notice, being prepared to deliver workshops where they have not seen the materials before and also revealing their wisdom and knowledge about difficult topics such as diversity, conflicts within the home and dealing with complex emotions.
