Dear Parent/Guardian,

I hope that this letter finds you well and that you have had a good summer. We have been delighted to celebrate the successes of our GCSE and A-level students, the headlines of which can be seen on our [website](#) and X account. We have had a team of students in Malawi, as part of a month-long expedition (see right). They had a magnificent experience and were a real credit to the school. The army cadets also took part in their annual summer camp and I have heard some really positive feedback back from the staff involved.

We are also pleased to announce that the Future Sport project is underway, with the field fenced off ready for the development to start in the next couple of weeks. There will be some changes to student routines, which will be communicated at the start of term.

Beginning of term arrangements.

- Mon 1 Sep – staff training day (no students in school)
- Tue 2 Sep – Year 7 and 12 induction day (see separate instructions for those year groups)
- Wed 3 Sep – return to school for all students (school starts at 8.45am); students register in form rooms and normal lessons start from p3 onwards. Details of form rooms are below and will be on display in the canteen.

- Year 8 – H5-10 (humanities block)

- Year 11 – Q7-11, L3 (mainly MFL corridor)
- Year 12/13 – S1 – 18, IT2, M3, C1 (mainly science block)

Attendance requirements

School attendance is a legal requirement. Absence negatively impacts a child's academic potential and performance and denies them the opportunity to interact socially with their peers and build experiences beyond the classroom. All pupils should aim to attend school 100% of the time. Attendance and punctuality continue to be monitored rigorously and as of September, we will maintain the approach introduced last academic year, in line with the [mandatory guidelines](#) published by the Department for Education. This includes:

- The daily sharing of attendance data with the Department for Education.
- Updated fine rates for unauthorised absence.
- Clear thresholds for penalty notices.
- Clear support and challenge to address any punctuality issues.

Term-time holidays will not be authorised. We are obliged to consider issuing a penalty notice to parents if a child misses five days of school due to unauthorised absence. Where attendance or punctuality causes concern, appropriate levels of challenge and support will be implemented. If a child's attendance falls below 90%, they are classed as persistently absent. In such cases, the school will liaise with the Local Authority and an Education Welfare Officer, who may initiate legal proceedings if parents/carers are not meeting their legal obligation to ensure their child attends school. Our priority remains to take a 'support-first' approach, working with students and families to overcome any barriers to attendance. Behaviour expectations


We are proud that Ofsted rated our behaviour and attitudes as Outstanding, and we remain fully committed to maintaining these exceptional standards across all aspects of school life within lessons, during trips and activities, and while travelling to and from school. Our policies are available on the school website, and we ask all students to uphold our CREDIT values and embrace our atomic habits (page 3). Atomic habits are the small, seemingly insignificant things which if done consistently lead to positive outcomes. By setting high expectations for behaviour, we foster an environment that promotes both academic excellence and personal wellbeing. During the last academic year, we introduced several key changes to strengthen our approach to behaviour which we will continue to embed this year:

- A structured response to classroom disruption: following a warning and behaviour point, students can expect to receive Same Day Detention if disruption persists. This reinforces expectations and minimise loss of learning.
- Any unauthorised use of mobile phones result in a Same Day Detention.
- Persistent disruption is addressed with appropriate consequences and targeted support to help students engage positively with school life.

We continue to take a clear and consistent approach to behaviour, offering support where needed while maintaining high standards that define our school community. Your support is greatly appreciated in this area.

The QM Experience Fund

I hope that you have enjoyed a restful summer and that both you and your child is looking forward to the new academic year with a sense of purpose and optimism. It is important to us that by the end of their time at Queen Mary's we have equipped them with the tools to face the future with confidence, including a strong academic portfolio. We have found, though, that it is not just exam results but also life experiences that shape young lives and opens doors. It is this 'QM experience' that sets us apart and makes our school such a rewarding place to work and study.

The School has many fine traditions dating back 470 years, including the embodiment of our School motto, *Quas dederis, solar semper habebis opes* which translates as 'It is what you give that you will keep as eternal riches'. Our hope is that you will again consider giving to the QM Experience Fund to help us to help your child, and others, as he matures. Whether it is through sport, music, drama, language learning or one of the many other extra-curricular activities, we hope that your child will make the absolute most of the QM experience in their time with us.

We try our best to provide these activities through our school budget or at as low a cost as possible. 

Attendance – Autumn term

Out of 25200 pupil sessions (70 school days):

- Present 95.4%
- Illness 2.8%
- Unauthorised absence 1.0%
- Other (medical/dental/religious etc) 0.8%

We are committed to an expectation of 100% attendance for all pupils.

The pupils with the highest attainment at the end of key stage 4 have higher rates of attendance compared to those with the lowest attainment.


Achievement Points – Autumn term

A total of 2315 points have been awarded to Y11.

The average pupil has 13 points

The most popular reasons for APs are:

- Outstanding effort 954
- Outstanding behaviour 385
- Outstanding classwork 346



Behaviour Points – Autumn term

A total of 1091 points have been awarded to Y11.

The average pupil has 6 points.

The most common reasons for BPs are:

- Low level poor behaviour 400
- Missing Homework 293
- Other behaviour issues 78



Before the Exam

- Know **which exams you are entered for**
- Understand the **format and structure** of each exam or assessment you will take.
- Read the **exam board rules**
- Check the **timetable** for each exam and know the location and start times.
- Bring the **correct equipment**
- Ensure you understand **access arrangements** if you are entitled to them (e.g., extra time, readers, scribes).
- Know what to do if you experience **illness or exceptional circumstances** before the exam (e.g., contacting your center).

During the Exam

- Follow all **JCQ/Exam Board rules** on behaviour, communication, and use of materials.
- Arrive on time and be seated according to the exam centre's instructions.
- Only bring **permitted items** into the exam room (e.g., clear pencil case, water bottle without labels).
- Do **not** bring prohibited items such as mobile phones, smartwatches, or notes.
- Listen carefully to the invigilators and follow all instructions given.
- Manage your time effectively and ensure you complete all required sections of the paper.
- If you need help (e.g., extra paper, feeling unwell), raise your hand and speak to an invigilator.



Essential Stationery for Students

- Black pens (required for most UK exams)
- Pencils (HB for writing, 2B for diagrams)
- Eraser
- Pencil sharpener
- Scientific calculator (exam-approved model)
- All of the above in a clear pencil case
- Water bottles should be clear with no labels

★ Typical Improvement based on school pattern

- Most students improve by **1 grade** between Year 11 mocks and the real GCSEs.
- Many students improve by **2 grades** with focused revision and feedback use.
- Larger jumps (3+ grades) do happen, but they are **less common** and usually linked to major changes in revision habits or motivation





Key messages

- Space your revision out – do not cram!
- Test yourself regularly – start with a blank page...
- Understand, don't just memorise. Apply the knowledge
- Minimise distraction during revision – put phones away!
- Rest and reward – consolidate what you have learned.
- Practice and apply – use past exam papers.



A young carer is someone under 18 who helps look after someone in their family, or a friend, who is ill, disabled or misuses drugs or alcohol.

They may help by:

- Shopping, cooking, cleaning
- Managing medicines or money
 - Providing personal care
- Helping the person get up in the morning
 - or get to bed at night.
- Helping to get people out the house
 - Keeping an eye on someone
- Providing emotional support

Across the UK, as many as 1 in 5 children and young people are young carers.

Support we try and offer young carers is as follows...

- regular drop-ins from Monday to Wednesday at break time for young carers to chat with either ***Mrs Hill or Mr Collins*** if they need to.
- we can offer a private room for a young carer to call home should they be worried about someone at home whilst at school.
- a 'time out' card if they are feeling overwhelmed.
- SEMH support.

Entry requirements

- 54 points from the best 8 GCSE subjects – must include English and Maths
- At least grade 6 in Maths and English
- At least grade 7 in the subjects you wish to study at A Level
- At least grade 8 in Maths to study Further Maths as a fourth A Level (the only one allowed)
- You need to choose A Level Maths if you want to take A Level Physics



The Process

- Mock exam results released: **w/c Monday 15 December 2025**
- Online application form deadline: **Friday 30 January 2026**
- Year 11 Parent Information Evening: **Monday 12 January 2026**
- Work on timetabling and options: **February – March 2026**
- Reserve options are really important!
 - Subjects may not run if we have low numbers
 - Subjects may clash in the timetable
- Confirmation of options: by midday GCSE results day: **Thursday 20 August 2026**
- No guarantee that we will be able to swap options after January 30th 2026. Several subjects were full on GCSE results day and students could not swap
- If there is space and the options blocks allow it, we will do what we can.



Decision-Making advice for Year 11 students

- Don't be influenced by your friends – their futures are not yours!
- Don't be overly influenced by older siblings and family – the educational landscape has changed significantly
- There are no “easy” subjects at A-level
- There is no guarantee you will be taught by a particular teacher
- Don't be overly governed by mock exam results – take the long view!
- Which subjects do you enjoy?
- In which subjects have you enjoyed most success in the past?
- What career do you have in mind?
- For a vast majority of degrees and careers there are no special subject requirements
- Do some research in advance: UCAS, Unifrog, subject teachers
- It will be hard work but well-worth it!





Potential Outcomes

- Students who received a **grade 7 at GCSE**: Our data shows that 75% of pupils get a grade D, E, U
- A-Level maths contains lots of algebra, generally students getting a grade 7 are not strong with their algebra.

DECISION-MAKING

Some Harsh Truths

- **Progression to Sixth Form at QMGS is not automatic**
 - 41 students did not achieve the GCSE entry requirements in English, Maths or 54 points overall in 2025
 - About 7 out of every class of 30!
 - 23% of the cohort started in a different school or college in September 2025
- **Looking back at Year 11 Mock Results 2024 ...**
 - 60 students achieved below APS Grade 6 (a third)
 - Of those, 34 students did not achieve the QMGS entry requirements at GCSE 2025
 - 55% of the lowest achievers in last year's Year 11 mock exams started a new school or college in September
- **All students must apply to other 6th forms NOW!**



The Process

- **All students must also apply to other schools, colleges or apprenticeships**
 - You may not get the grades to return to QMGS
 - You may not get the grade you need to take a specific subject at QM
 - You may decide in August that you want a fresh start
